



## GUIDE TO PRESIDENT TRUMP'S SEPTEMBER 24 TRAVEL BAN PROCLAMATION

President Trump's proclamation **indefinitely** restricts entry to the United States for the following:

<b>CHAD* LIBYA* YEMEN*</b>	<b>SOMALIA*</b>	<b>IRAN*</b>	<b>NORTH KOREA SYRIA*</b>	<b>VENEZUELA</b>

### BAN EXEMPTIONS

- U.S. Lawful Permanent Residents
- Individuals who are dual citizens of non-banned countries
- Admitted asylum seekers and refugees
- Diplomats
- **Until October 18 only:** Travellers from **Iran, Libya, Somalia, Syria, and Yemen** with a "bona fide" relationship to a U.S. citizen, employer, or institution

### WAIVERS FOR ENTRY

Banned individuals seeking entry to the United States may apply for a waiver, to be considered for approval by U.S. consular officers on a case-by-case basis. The applicant must prove all of the following<sup>1</sup>:

1. Being refused entry would cause them an "undue burden"
2. They are not a national security threat to the United States
3. Their entry would be in the U.S. national interest
